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## OUR NEED OF SHEER SILENCE

There are very few times in my day to day life when I experience silence. There is the ever-present ambient noise of the city or the office: traffic, planes, power mowers, power tools, the intrusive alerts from computers signaling new emails or texts, ringtones. I find myself obsessively plugged in to the news.

And then there is the noise in my head: racing thoughts, internal conversations, grocery lists, music. Even—or perhaps especially—when the world around me is mostly still, I notice that I am not.

I'm not sure what drives this acoustic and mental busyness, but I know I'm not the only one who seldom experiences silence. Maybe we are just trying to get more stuff done. Maybe it's FOMO—fear of missing out. Maybe it's habit. I do know that this constant noise and stimulation can be exhausting and stressful. The more noise, the louder we become in order to be heard, which leads to more noise.

In recent weeks we have been overwhelmed - we are still stuck in this pandemic. We worry about our children who are too young to get vaccinated. We worry about our elders. We worry about ourselves.

In an effort to make sense of all this, we seek to gather more information and more data, which we hope will give us answers or show us a way out. There is no shortage of voices. We are bombarded with experts and pundits analyzing everything, talking and talking and talking. Some days I just want it all to stop.

The [prophet Elijah](#) had a profound experience of silence. He was fleeing for his life from the wrath of Jezebel. I imagine the stress was generating a lot of internal noise. But the word of the Lord came to Elijah and said, "Go out and stand on the mountain before the Lord, for the Lord is about to pass by" (1 Kings 19:11).

And then we read: "Now there was a great wind, so strong that it was splitting mountains and breaking rocks in pieces before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire a sound of sheer silence" (11-12).

Wind and earthquakes and fire all seem reasonable when God makes an entrance. There are many instances in Scripture when God is announced in sound and pyrotechnics. But this story from 1 Kings has always caught my attention. The phrase in verse 12 is often translated as the sound of "a still, small voice." Yet it wasn't the sound of a voice that indicated that God was present. It was the sound of sheer silence. "When Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his mantle and stood at the entrance of the cave" (13).

Spending time [in silence](#) is a spiritual discipline. My spiritual director once urged me to spend 20 minutes in silence every day. I can do about five. Silence is not a technique but a way of being in God's presence. It's pretty simple, but it's not easy.

Elijah, when he heard the sound of sheer silence, he wrapped his face in his mantle for he knew he was in the presence of the Holy. It changed him. It changed him for good. It can change us.

# Rural Connect

If you are from Saskatchewan, you likely have rural connections. Either you grew up on a farm, in a farming community or you are related to someone who did. Even if you moved to Saskatchewan as an adult, you probably have some connection to a rural community.

Saskatchewan is like one big small town - we are all connected to each other.

**This is why Rural Connect makes so much sense for us.**

**Rural Connect is** a program of The United Church that brings together the wisdom, experiences and faith of those in rural and urban communities of faith. These are partnerships that have the potential to be incredibly exciting, energizing, life-giving and faith growing. Rural Connect was started years ago in Ontario and is now poised to move into the Prairies with leadership by the McClure community of faith.

**Rural Connect isn't** about keeping “dying” ministries alive. It's about breathing new life and energy into ministries – urban and rural - that have a desire to be renewed. Rural Connect isn't about charity from the strong to the struggling: It's about sharing diverse gifts and better enabling us to serve God and to live Christ's love in the world.

Rural Connect is **powerful** by design and **simple** in the way it works. A community of faith, often but not always urban, becomes a hub. **The hub partners with satellite churches**, often rural, to experience live, interactive worship experiences that involve both the hub and the satellite communities of faith. The hub installs the necessary communications equipment and trains volunteers to operate it. The satellite churches each receive an equipment box which they plug in and turn on – nothing more complicated than using a TV remote control! The box connects the satellite churches with the hub church on Sunday morning for **worship that involves active leadership from each partner** (e.g., one partner might read the scripture, another might read prayers and another might offer special music). It is the responsibility of the hub to lead the development of an order of service each week and to coordinate leadership from each of the partners.

McClure has a history of innovation in ministry. Former Board Chair, Ruth Mireau, wrote in our renewal documents that “we are in a good position to serve as a HUB in the community”. A group of Saskatchewan clergy - some urban, some rural - believe that McClure United Church would be an ideal hub to introduce Rural Connect to this province. At its meeting in September, our McClure Board agreed that the ideals expressed by Rural Connect align with our own. McClure shares with many other congregations a **strong desire for collaborative ministry that honours the diversity and gifts of all God's people and creates opportunities for those gifts to be shared.**

It is going to take a bit of time and lots of congregation involvement to get Rural Connect up and running at McClure. The goal is to be ready early in 2022.

- We'll need to **identify three satellite communities of faith** with which to partner: Laura has been part of the clergy group that have imagined bringing Rural Connect to Saskatchewan, so we begin

from a place of good collaboration and connections. You can help by letting us know of communities of faith that you think might be good partners with us.

- We'll need to **install some different communications equipment in our church building.** We'll have the leadership of Randy Boyd, Coordinator of Rural Connect in Canada, to ensure this happens seamlessly. The equipment needed for Rural Connect will augment and complement our other needs for a digitally-equipped sanctuary.
- We'll need to **identify and train a group of McClure people to operate the hub equipment** during worship services. We are assured that it is not complicated, nothing compared to what we all had to learn over this past year and a half! A dozen or so individuals who are committed to be part of a three-person team for one worship service each month is all we need, and age is no barrier to participation!
- We'll need **the people of McClure to engage in thoughtful conversation with each other and listen for God's word as we prayerfully consider how Rural Connect is integrated into our life and worship here at McClure United Church.** What must we hold on to and what can we let go of? Please become involved in the conversation so that we live into the Rural Connect ministry in a good way.

Technology will never fully replace face to face, in person ministry, yet we have learned during this pandemic that technology opens some doors. We have learned how to do things out of necessity that we had never even thought of before - the weekly, province-wide Bible study is an example.

Now we have the opportunity to take those learnings, and everything else we know about ourselves, to create something amazing... building on those important and life-giving rural and urban connections so together we are able to worship God - strengthening our spirits for the ministry to which we have all been called.

## November 2021 - Spiritual Practices for Children

### 1. As You See God

Using clay, play dough, or Model Magic™ create something that shows what you think God is like. Whatever that looks like or feels like to you. Can you represent God's love? Can you make God's peace? Use your clay. Create something that represents God as you see God.

### 2. Good Morning Body Prayer

When you wake up in the morning start your day with God by praying with your whole body. Stand next to your bed and reach for the sky. Say "good morning" to God. Now stretch your arms out wide and thank God for your blessings. Then hug your arms into yourself and ask God to be present within you today. Repeat two or three times. What other actions and words could you add to your morning body prayer?

### 3. Point, Learn, and Pray

Using a globe or world map, close your eyes, turn around, and point to a place to learn about and pray for the people, animals, and environment there. Learn more about the place you chose by researching it online or at a library. What have you learned about that place? Do this each week to learn about a new place, new people, new animals, and plants that you can keep in your heart and pray for each day.

### 4. See the Light of God

Think back through your day. What made you happy, or where did you see the light of God? Share that moment with your family. What made you sad, or where did you feel distant from God (maybe something you wish you could do differently)? Share that moment. Allow each member of the family to share. Once you have shared, consider what God might be inviting you to do tomorrow. Now offer a prayer thanking God for this time of sharing and ask for guidance as you start the new day.

### 5. Practice Time with God

Do you have a skill that you are learning that requires practice? Do you play the piano or other musical instrument? Paint? Dance? Play sports? Each time you get ready to practice think of that time as personal time with God. Celebrate your talent by sharing every facet with God. Talk to God about how you are feeling whether you are excited, frustrated, happy, sad, or even bored. Tell God all about it. Think of your practice time as a time with God. You are in this together!

### 6. Nature Walk

As a family go for a walk in nature. As you walk notice the beauty of all of God's creation. Name the beauty you see for your child. Get down on the ground together and look at the tiniest pieces of creation. Ask your child what is beautiful to them. Comment on the things you see, hear, smell, and the way things feel. Model the words for your child to describe God's bounty. As you walk, take deep breaths and ask your child to do the same. Every few minutes stop, take a deep breath and repeat, "God's beauty is everywhere!"

## The History of McClure's Refugee Efforts -Part Four

This is a list (probably partial) of the kinds of things the committee dealt with over the years for each family:

- filling out application forms to request refugees come to Canada. Filling out forms for a particular person or family took more time. After the application was sent it became a waiting game (sometimes 2-3 months but sometimes up to a year or more).
- meet and welcome refugees when they arrived.
- have suitable housing ready (furnished) for refugees at a price that was affordable.
- completing applications for a variety of services such as health cards, bus passes, library cards, leisure cards etc.
- registering each child for school and parents into English classes and Open Door Society.
- assist families with money management and daily living skills such as buying groceries etc.
- accompany family members when riding the bus until they understood the system and routes to key places.
- find interpreters to assist with language barriers.
- communicate with the children's teachers to monitor academic progress and behaviors. Assist parents and staff in problem solving when difficulties arise.
- arrange appointments with health care professionals
- initially provide taxi service and childcare in the first few months.
- search for, register and pay for recreation and leisure activities for the children to take part in.
- assist some people in learning to drive, write their tests and purchase a vehicle.
- contact other churches or groups that may be interested in sponsoring refugees.
- help in any cases of emergency
- assist individuals in finding employment and integration into Canadian society.

Many of the refugees have become Canadian citizens.

**Joint sponsorship** with the government means that the government supplies the money and we as a committee supply the personnel and contacts.

## SOCKS FOR THE HOMELESS



Once again McClure is collecting filled socks for the homeless in Saskatoon.

If you are looking for an act of kindness, and/or another alternative to gift giving this Christmas, you might want to consider doing up a sock for either a homeless man or a woman in Saskatoon.

Make it a family affair. Please mark the socks for either a woman or man.

Bins will be placed at the **East doors** for the socks. We ask you to fill the socks and bring them to the church either on Saturday, November 13<sup>th</sup> or November 20<sup>th</sup>, from 10 am – 12 noon. This will give us plenty of time to get them to the appropriate people for distribution in time for Christmas. The items will be handed out to men and women living on the street by Community Support Officers during the weeks before Christmas. **Remember if you are entering the church you must wear a mask.**

### SUGGESTIONS FOR SOCKS FOR THE HOMELESS (MEN AND WOMEN)

Start with a good pair of warm socks. Fill one of the socks with any of the following suggested items **plus** the sock that you have not used.

#### Toiletries:

Bar of soap in a container

Travel size – shampoo, hand lotion, Kleenex, bandaids, toothpaste, toothbrush, shaving cream.

Brush and comb

Razor – preferably a good razor

Hand sanitizer

#### Survival Items:

Gloves, toque, hand warmers, shoe warmers, silver thermal blanket (\$Store), poncho (\$store)

#### Miscellaneous:

Nail clippers, deck of cards, flashlight, dice, notepad and pen, wrapped candy, candy canes, hot chocolate packages, cup of soup packages, masks, etc.

**Gift Certificates from any place like Tim Horton's, McDonald's that are open 24 hours (places of refuge in -40 degree weather).**

Once the sock is full, add a card with a special *handwritten message* such as:

Prayers are with you,  
May you find peace and love in the following year,  
You are loved, etc.


