"The Waiting Place...for people just waiting. Waiting for a train to go or a bus to come, or a plane to go or the mail to come, or the rain to go or the phone to ring, or the snow to snow or waiting around for a Yes or a No or waiting for their hair to grow. Everyone is just waiting." ~Dr. Seuss

This week I had the honour of walking with a family in the waiting place we call Palliative Care at St. Paul's Hospital. For the children waiting with their mum, the time was long. Waiting means it's not yet time to grieve, not yet time to call far away friends. Waiting means there are no answers yet for the boss about a return to work. Waiting makes you wonder if there is time for coffee. But even with all the waiting, when the moment came for their beloved mum to go back to God, her children were surprised. In just a moment, their mum was released from suffering, gone from the room. Grief, relief, peace, and tears flowed. Phone calls to friends began, and the hope of sleep returned.

The liturgical season of Advent that we are entering as a world-wide Christian family, represents The Waiting Place on the spiritual journey. In Advent, we are invited to notice the waiting places in our own lives as well as universal waiting places; waiting for healing, waiting for hope, and most of all, waiting for peace. Just as Dr. Seuss reminds us that The Waiting Place is somewhere we cannot avoid in his book, "Oh the Places You'll Go", Christians acknowledge that it is a place we will return to again and again each year in Advent.

In the gospel for the first Sunday of Advent, we hear Jesus say,

"Therefore, keep awake - for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake." ~Mark 13:35-37

This passage reminds us that, like the children keeping vigil with their mum, we will not know the moment when God will choose to take action in our lives, but we will not be left in the waiting place forever. These powerful words call us to wait in anticipation and in hope. These words invite us to wait for the one who will act when the time is right.

In some ways, my journey to McClure United Church seemed to take a long time. Together, we spent months waiting and wondering, discussing, and discerning. Only weeks after my family received the wonderful news that we would be joining McClure, we heard that a five-year-old boy would be joining our family. If we weren't awake before, we are now! I am surprised and grateful, humbled and delighted by God's good timing. As my little family waits and wades through the process of bonding and becoming four when we were once three, as we wait to join you and Rev. Debra in our new faith community, I pray that your time of waiting will be blessed with hope. And I pray that you will be awake when your time of waiting has passed and the love and peace, joy and wisdom of God flow into your life.

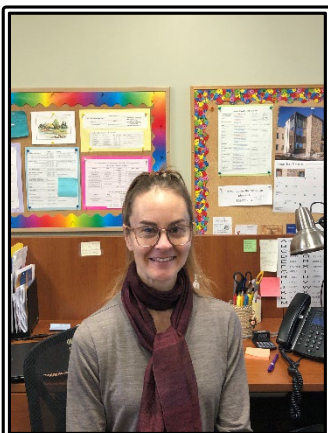


McClure Votes Yes

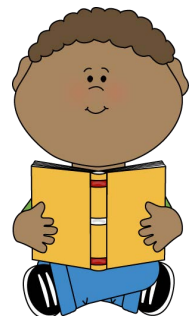

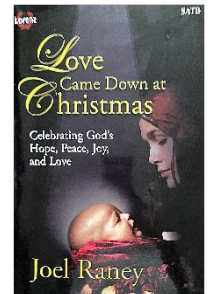

Hi My name is Don Hanke and I have been a member of McClure for 30 years. In February of 2013 a group of 21 McClure members embarked on a trip to Nicaragua to visit the Bosawas Biosphere Reserve region to attend an opening ceremony of a school in the village of Pamkawas.

In 2012 a member of McClure left a sizeable legacy gift to our church and within the mandate a portion of this gift must go to outreach. Members of the committee searched for a deserving charity and came upon a Canadian organization in Edmonton called Change For Children. This organization has been around for 48 years and have done work through out Central America, South America and Africa. Some of their projects include building schools, water wells, food security projects, Dental Brigades and most

recently education programs such as Teach The Teacher and education programs for young girls. Dental Brigades are comprised of volunteer dentists, dental hygienists and volunteer helpers from all over Canada. This group can be as large as 15 to 20 people. We usually visit three to four villages and can see as many as 30 to 40 patients in a day. This service is provided free of charge and the volunteers usually pay for their transportation.

I am currently serving my third term on the Change for Children board of directors and see the great things that they do. Over the last ten years I have had the opportunity to return to Nicaragua five times and hope to return in February for a dental brigade to the Nicaraguan Caribbean coast.

I wish to thank McClure congregation and the Outreach committee for their continued support over the years to this much needed origination.

REMEMBERING A CHRISTMAS LESSON FROM LONG AGO.

The excitement was growing as a group of 30 first year nursing students anxiously waited in the lobby of the Winnipeg General Hospital Nurses residence for their rides to arrive. We were heading home for Christmas; home to our families for the first time in four months. I stood, with my suitcase and a large shopping bag of presents, waiting for my cousin to arrive.

A taxi pulled up and four gals from Yorkton jumped in with their luggage. They were off to the bus depot to take the Greyhound home. Finally, my cousin and her boyfriend arrived and I reached down to pick up my suitcase and bag of presents. Where is my bag of presents? It was here just a few moments ago. Now it is gone. It is no where in sight. Others were saying "the taxi driver must have picked it up with the Yorkton luggage." We jumped in the car and rushed to the bus depot only to find we were too late. The classmates had checked their luggage in a locker and had gone downtown for something to eat.

I was devastated. I was in the depths of despair. I was going home for Christmas with nothing to give. The train ride should have been a fun experience because it was full with university students from Quebec and Ontario heading home for Christmas. Everyone was partying except one very distressed student nurse and my cousin's best efforts to cheer me up came to naught.

When Dad picked us up in Regina, I was in tears and cried the whole way home to Estevan. He was a problem solver but I didn't know the names of the gals from Yorkton (there were 154 in my class and at that time I didn't know them all). I had no way of contacting them and I wasn't even sure they had my gifts.

Mom and Dad were very supportive and Mom said she would give me some money and we would go shopping in the morning. More tears flowed. I couldn't imagine replacing the Barbie clothes I made for my little sister, the Beatles cap for my brother and the jumper I made for my Mom. I did not have the heart to get new gifts. I knew then that the months of sewing and shopping for my family had been life giving in the time of homesickness and loneliness prior to Christmas. Preparing for Christmas helped me to focus outside of myself. Now it was all gone. I was home with my family but I had nothing to give.

In the meantime, my bag of gifts traveled to Yorkton. It was only then that the Yorkton gals realized that the bag didn't belong to them. Judy took it home and started to read the gift tags to see who owned this bag. My nursing cap was on top with my name label inside. And by some miracle Judy remembered that I was from Estevan and the next day she started to phone the Perrys in Estevan. That is a phone call I will never forget; tears welled up again when I realized that my gifts had been found. Judy's parents packed up the gifts and put them on the bus bound for Estevan.

On December 24th, Christmas Eve, as our family headed for church to mark the birth of Jesus, we stopped at the bus depot to retrieve my lost presents. The relief was overwhelming and I knew then that Christmas for me would always be about sharing and giving.

On that marvelous, miraculous, Christmas morning I experienced the awesome joy of love and contentment.
A gift of God, I will never forget.

May God's generous spirit fill your heart this Christmas season.
