"Of all the wise teachers who have come into my life, none are more eloquent than these, who wordlessly in leaf and vine embody the knowledge of relationship. Alone, a **bean** is just a vine, **squash** an oversized leaf. Only when standing together with **corn** does a whole emerge which transcends the individual. The gifts of each are more fully expressed when they are nurtured together than alone. In ripe ears and swelling fruit, they counsel us that all gifts are multiplied in relationship. This is how the world keeps going." (pg 140 <u>Braiding Sweetgrass:</u> Indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teaching of Plants by Robin Wall Kimmerer)

My experience of gardening is limited. My Dad was the parent in charge of our modest plot of land. Each vegetable in his garden was carefully planted in a proper straight row with an appropriate space between, for the hoe to get in there after the weeds. A man for whom everything had a place and everything was to be in place, Dad's garden reflected order, symmetry and good practice.

Kimmerer's description of the Three Sisters garden is radically different from my experience of garden. Kimmerer suggest that a Three Sister garden is a blue print for the world, a map of balance and harmony. In the Three Sister garden the corn stands tall with ribbons of leaves that curl away from the stem in every direction to catch the sun. No leaf sits directly over the next, so that each can gather light without shadowing the others. The beans twine around the corn stalk, weaving themselves between the leaves of the corn. The space where the corn leaves are not, buds appear on the vining beans. Spread around the base of the corn and beans is a carpet of big broad squash leaves that intercept the light that falls among the pillars of corn.

By late summer, the beans hang in heavy cluster of smooth green pods, ears of corn angle out from the stalk, fattening in the sunshine, and pumpkins swell at your feet. Acre for acre, a Three Sisters garden yields more food than if you grew each of the sisters alone (Kimmerer, p.131).

Jesus understood this garden wisdom. Where ever he found people separated from community he pulled them back in. Jesus knew that it was when people were intertwined together, each offering their unique gifts that the fullness of life was known. Jesus knew that it was in community that balance and harmony were possible.

However, your garden grows, I pray that you feel the constant pull of your God into community. I pray you will feel Gods tug to share your unique gifts with others so that together we can grow strong and full of life. Your sisters need you; your brothers need you; your siblings need you and you need them. In gratitude, growing with you. Debra

STAYING CONNECTED


Family Ministry
