Contemplating Aging.

It all started with a photograph. My brother sent me a photo of my dad taken over forty years ago. In the photo he was wearing work coveralls and he was in a pit installing a friend's septic tank for his cottage. His smile took me back to a time when Dad was a vital hard-working fun-loving man who never hesitated to help others. Happy to work; happy to help. My dad died 20 years ago and this photo filled me with the warmth of his smile and his generosity. I felt like it was just yesterday. Such a comfort to know that loved ones who have died will be remembered and cherished all my days.

Ever since I hit the age of seventy-five, I have given a lot of thought to my future not knowing how long that future will be. It is a strange cohort, being in our 70s and 80s. So many of our friends and acquaintances have died and our circle of friends is changing. We are reminded of our own vulnerability; the fragility of life. I remember Mom wondering why she was still hanging on when so many of her acquaintances had died. I understand that sentiment now.

I, like most people, have spent my entire life **looking to the future. It is the way we human beings grow and survive.** We crawl, we walk, we run, we jump. As teenagers we venture into adulthood full of questions and hopes and dreams for our future. We get an education so that we can work in a field that interests us and we practise until we are proficient in our work. **Always looking forward.** We, of course, sometimes make mistakes along the way; either by omission or commission; but in the end forgiveness is there. Others forgive us, God forgives us and most importantly we forgive ourselves.

We are creative beings. Most of us are always creating a new skill or talent, always caring for our family and friends and creating a loving environment. When I was fifty years old, I decided to go to university and I earned two degrees. I moved into the world of being a minister in the church and that opened all kinds of new experiences. **Always looking forward.**

We look forward until we eventually reach the age of retirement. Retirement then challenges us to look within ourselves to find areas of interest and unfulfilled dreams so that we can continue to create and contribute to our community. So that we can continue to look forward to the future.

As a hospital chaplain, I supported many people in their last days. One of the important lessons I learned was to **always be changing your goals.** I recall a fellow telling me he used to run the 5 K race, then his running days ended and eventually his goal changed to walking around the block. Then his goal was to walk with the aid of a walker to the deck of his apartment.

As our health deteriorates, our goals change, but still for many of us, we look for what can we accomplish today. As we move closer to death, we start to live in the present, enjoying every person, every bird song and the wind in the trees. We watch the leaves stir, the snow swirl and experience the warmth of the sun and the joy of loved ones who surround us. We live our life to the end. It is my hope that this is true for me and for you. I hope that when my family look at photos of me, a smile will come to their face as they remember all the good times we lived through together.

NEWS FROM THE MCCLURE CHURCH BOARD

Board Report

Differences are inevitable,
But Division is a Choice.

This was an outdoor sign in a local school yard that I noticed on my way home the other day. Differences are inevitable but division is a choice. It got me pondering about life nowadays. Whether at home, school, on the job, or in our faith community, decisions need to be made. Sometimes we agree with the decision and sometimes we don't. But how we handle our different opinions is so very important to the well-being of the group.

On Jan. 28, the McClure Church Board met once again to consider a host of exciting events happening in our community, as well as making a final decision about the 2025 Budget, which will be presented at the Congregational meeting on Sunday, Feb. 23. Budget proceedings are taken very seriously by Board members, with each committee chair meeting with their respective group. A budget for the committee is presented and then the Finance Folks do their work. Income is carefully calculated and estimated. No one knows for sure how the year will go exactly. Will the income be up or down? And then there are the expenses: the committees' budgets, the expenses of the building, the wages of employees, new exciting projects, the unknown. We have savings. Do we spend them? So many questions and lots of opinions; differences of opinions too. But how do we keep our questions from dividing us?

I recently attended a cluster meeting of all the United Churches in Saskatoon and area. The Right Reverend Jordan Cantwell (former moderator of the United Church of Canada) spoke to us about Adaptive Change in the church. Her presentation was full of interesting perspectives, but one thought really caught my attention. We can no longer think only of the church of our past. This church only exists in the past. If we keep doing things as if we are in survival mode, to keep things the same, the trajectory of our decline is rapidly increased. We need to move forward, to try experiments in new ways of reaching out, even if we fail. Jordan invites us to think about how we want our church to look in 10 years from now!

With all this in mind, I invite you to come to the Congregational meeting on Feb. 23, (right after church), to discuss, to listen, and to hopefully leave the meeting with a sense of unity in our Community of Faith. See you there.

McClure Warms Some Hearts Over Christmas



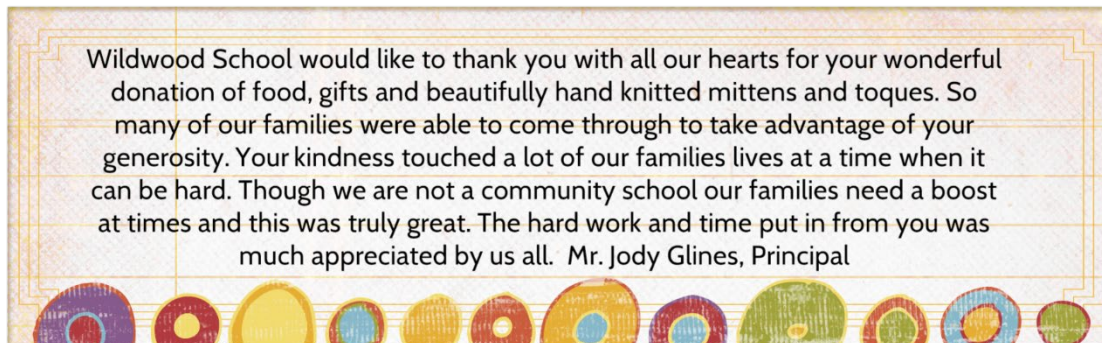
They say it's the most wonderful time of the year. But for many, the joy of Christmas seems far away. And that's where McClure community of faith comes in. Over the weeks before Christmas your generosity filled more than **100 socks** with treats for folks living on the streets of Saskatoon. With **baby formula** being the most requested item by the food bank we collected 72 cans of baby formula (and a local preschool joined in and sent 17 more cans for a total of 89). Then there was the sale of the lovely **greeting cards** made by members of Crocus Coop. We had \$375 to contribute to the local organization that helps folks with mental health issues.

But perhaps the most heart-warming project was the **collection of food for a neighbourhood school**, whose principal reached out to us before Christmas for help. So many of you brought food that the office had to set up tables to hold it all. **Many knitters brought in mitts and toques too**. Rev. Emily said 12 people talked to her about the possibility of extending some kind of help to the school in the new year! When the morning arrived for a pick up of the food, the principal brought his truck and three young helpers, new to Canada. Showing them a little of the sanctuary, the kids were in awe of the tree and toys under it from our White Gift Sunday.

Walking down the hallway together, one of them exclaimed, "Wow Can anybody come here?"

It was later decided to **donate the toys to the school** with the principal saying that he would share with his colleagues who were working with the most vulnerable kids in the city. So, you can imagine the wide eyes and a very emotional principal bringing his truck back on a second day, and three different helpers to pick up a truck full of toys. The principal said that they were planning on letting parents come and choose a toy for their children. He said that would be life changing for many parents.

So, what started out just being a food collection on a Sunday in December, really turned out to be an opportunity to share love and warmth with others. We have decided to reconnect with the principal and see what else we can help with in the New Year. **A huge thank you to all the generous folks in our Community of Faith, for your contributions to all the Christmas giving projects. Well done!!**

FUNERAL HOSPITALITY CO-ORDINATOR RESPONSIBILITIES

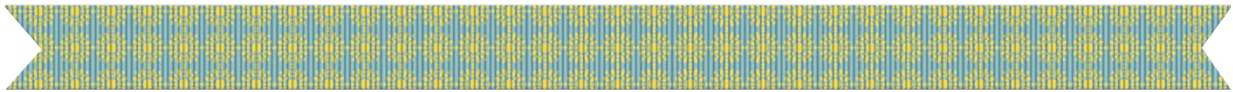
The primary role of the co-coordinators is:

1. Organize preparation of coffee, tea and juices. (Set up instructions in the binder)
2. Find servers to help (Sign up List is the servery cupboard)
3. Organize the clean-up of the dining room and servery.

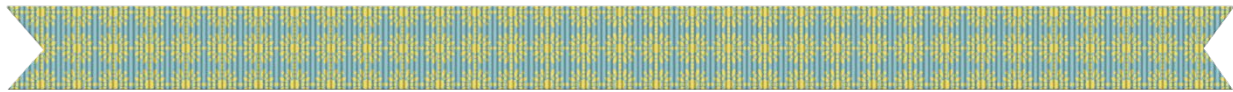
Be sure to indicate that the donation is for refugees.

A Deeper Look at McClure Outreach

This is the final article providing further insights into the many aspects of McClure's outreach activities that extend beyond the \$16,750 figure in the 2024 operating budget in our annual budget.

I would like to thank Joel Reid, Reverend Debra Berg, and Jim Kells for writing articles in this series over the past three months.

One of the ways in which we help the greater community is by providing safe, welcoming discounted rental space (along with free parking) to AA groups. The discount these groups will receive this year totals \$9,750, as our Church does its part in supporting these worthwhile activities.

During December, one of the AA groups was having weekly youth AA meetings (with adult supervision) at no cost to the group.

As indicated by the articles the past number of months, McClure United Church provides support to refugees, seniors, the homeless, and AA groups, along with direct donations made via the Outreach Committee to various non-profit organizations throughout the city and province.

By providing this information through the newsletter, we hope to provide congregants with a complete picture of the many outreach activities undertaken and supported by our generous congregation.
